Syllabus <i>Theoretical part:</i> Every lesson includes reading comprehension of chosen texts (pronunciation, vocabulary, phrases), as well as introducing grammar forms important for those texts: <i>Stadt und Land (Kausalsätze), Gesundheit und Krankheit (Pronominaladverbien) Arbeitsplatz und Karriere (Vorgangspassiv), Geschäftsbrief (Finalsätze), Postsendungen (Adjektivdeklinationen), Fachbereich Augenoptik/Optometrie (Konditionalsätze, Konjunktiv, Infinitivkonstruktionen).</i> <i>Practical part:</i> Translating various texts about tourism. Practical classes directed towards further practice, revision and evaluation of students’ skills and knowledge. Gaining new knowledge, practice and revision in foreign language classes are interconnected and mutually dependent features.
